With the weather slowly getting better, we know that people wish to be outside enjoying their environs. We wholeheartedly endorse this and would encourage everyone to get outside and enjoy our amazing countryside.

- 3. Respect farm animals and wildlife

- 5. Leave what you find
- 6. Dispose of waste properly
- 7. Minimise the effects of fire



The first Sandwich Terns arrived back at Our Lady's Island on 22nd March. Whilst on the 13th April, two Sandwich Terns ringed at Lady's Island; one in 2016 and one in 2018, were spotted in Dakar, Senegal.

Peregrine Falcons

Unfortunately, not all stories can be good ones and not all ringed birds have a happy ending. Two Peregrine falcons, a male and a female, were found dead in Oaklands Quarry, New Ross.

The birds were taken for analysis to the Department of Agriculture veterinary laboratory in Kilkenny to determine the cause of their deaths.

Peregrine falcons are a protected species and therefore the deliberate killing of them is a criminal offence. Anyone with information is asked to contact their local garda station or the National Parks and Wildlife Service on 076 1002662.

White-tailed Sea Eagle

This visitor was seen around the Centre over the weekend of 23rd and 24th March and then again on the Monday where its presence hastened the departure of a number of the Greenland White-fronted Geese. Whilst he was observed by various members of staff, we were unable to ascertain whether he was tagged.



Our winter visitors have now left for their summer home in Greenland. They started to leave towards the end of March. Constant monitoring of the Geese provides us with vital information for their future protection.

In Spring 2018, the global population of Whitefronts comprised 20,529 which was down very slightly on the 20,556 the previous year, in essence a difference of 27 birds. Numbers visiting Wexford this year were around 7,200, down slightly from 7637 the previous year. The percentage of young in Wexford was 6.9% which is well below the figure desired of 14%. Brood size amongst the geese in Wexford was 2.88, roughly on a par with the previous count. Whilst here, 24 birds were caught, weighed, measured and ringed as ongoing research in to their movements, breeding and longevity.

Values for the total population size are missing in some years when complete coverage could not be achieved (open squares, for which estimated counts based on previous counts have been substituted). Values for spring 2001 were missing on account of the outbreak of Foot and Mouth Disease that year and were therefore also estimated from previous counts. The arrow marks the point at which autumn hunting in Iceland was stopped in 2006.

50 years of the Wexford Wildfowl Reserve

The 17th April 2019 marked the 50th anniversary of the establishment of a Wildbird refuge, comprising two parts known as the Western refuge and the Eastern refuge, here on the North Slob. The agreement was between Bill Fiske who owned the land and the Irish Wildbird Conservancy (later to become BirdWatch Ireland). The Western refuge, covering 244 acres is now known as the Wexford Wildfowl Reserve.

A small gathering of local staff,

members of the Fiske family and Birdwatch Ireland met to mark the occasion with coffee and cake.

Discussions were held to plan a celebration later on in the year to commemorate the 50 years with the wider public. The planning is still ongoing but it seems likely that a weekend during Goose week at the end of October will be the preferred time. This is mainly due to the presence of the Greenland White-fronted Geese for whom the reserve is such an important winter home and also to coincide with Goose week which is held during the Opera festival every year.
